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Spring Street Sweeping Blitz

The Spring Sweeping Blitz is designed to collect as much of the heavy dirt & debris as possible from the Priority 1, 2 & some Priority 3 streets, over the next 3 weeks. Additional parking restrictions will not be applied & ticketing & relocation towing will not be used during the blitz. As a result the sweepers will be going around parked vehicles & will focus mainly on the driving lanes of the roadway.

Sweepers will be on the higher traffic volume streets, such as Circle Dr, Idylwyld Dr, 22nd St, 8th St & College Dr (Priority 1 streets); & the majority of priority 2 streets. The schedule is dependent on weather, but if time permits, some Priority 3 streets will also be swept.

The purpose of the spring sweep blitz is designed as a quick pass through in order to remove the heavier dirt & debris so that the Accelerated Residential Sweep program can be a more effective & complete curb-to-curb sweep program & cover all streets (including those from the Spring Blitz).

Civic and private contractor crews will also be cleaning the boulevards areas adjacent to the sidewalks/curbs & centre medians to remove the debris that collected over the winter from snow storage. The debris will be swept onto the street and hauled away as part of the clean-up, with any remaining dirt being picked up by the sweepers.

Upon completion of the Spring Sweeping Blitz, the Accelerated Residential Street Sweeping program begins, where every street will be swept curb-to-curb by neighborhood including the business improvement districts. This six-week program will use relocation towing & a \$100 fine will be applied for parking on a scheduled street. The yellow 'sandwich style' No Parking signs will be used & augmented with yellow replica paper signs throughout the program where on-street vehicle parking is an issue.

Weather permitting, the scheduled start of the program is Monday, May 5. Further info will be provided closer to the launch date of the Accelerated Residential Street Sweeping.

Schedules and more information are available at saskatoon.ca as part of the Building Better Roads campaign. Saskatoon's Road Plan is a coordinated approach to repair, maintenance & construction in Saskatoon.

Garage Sale Tips

Before Sale Day & Set Up

- Be prepared for the garage sale BEFORE 8:00am as shoppers tend to show up early
- Have plenty of change on hand (coin & paper)
- Have enough tables to display your items
- Large colorful items should be placed at the front of your property to draw in customers
- Have an outlet available if customers want to try an appliance
- Clothing is best sold if hung neatly on a rack (a broom stick between two ladders works) and clearly priced



Pricing

- Have all pricing completed a week in advance, and set up tables the day before, ready to move them out to their visible locations.
- If you have odds-and-ends items, such as mismatched glasses, price them at 6 for \$1.00 instead of \$0.15
- Be prepared to barter with your customers, and as the day goes on you may want to reduce prices on some items to clear them out
- If doing a multi-group sale, put a last or first name initial on the tags, remove tags as you sell the items and then go through all tags at the end of the day to determine who gets what profit

Sale Day & Set Up

- Use balloons at the front of your lot to draw customers
- Park your vehicles off street if possible for visibility and parking & add some fun signs
- Count your float prior to the sale so you can keep track of your earnings
- Have Help! - at least two people available to run you sale allows you to have bathroom breaks and better customer service!

Graffiti

Graffiti is a criminal code offense which carries a maximum jail sentence of 2 years. Not only does graffiti make an area look unsafe and reduce property values, but it is an invitation for other criminal activity. The cost to Saskatoon residents as a result of reported graffiti vandalism each year is in excess of \$455,000. There are steps you, as a home owner, can take to reduce the chance that you will be a victim of this crime.

- **Keep your property neat and well-maintained.** This sends the message that you care about your property and your neighborhood and will not tolerate crime.
- **Plant clingy or thorny vegetation** such as vines, shrubs or rose bushes around your property. This limits wall space and access to surfaces that might otherwise be considered suitable for graffiti.
 - **Make property boundaries clear** by placing durable fencing around property lines.
 - **Remove objects in the area that encourage loitering.** For example, payphones and benches.
- **Install motion lighting around your property.** Not only do taggers like to commit their crimes under the mask of darkness, they don't like witnesses. Make sure to place your lights in such a location that they can not simply be unscrewed or damaged.
- **Remove graffiti promptly.** Taggers gain fame and power amongst their peers only if their peers are able to see their work. It is a proven fact that removing graffiti within 24 hours dramatically lessens the chance that it will reappear.

REPORT GRAFFITI!!

If you notice tags on your property please contact the Saskatoon Police Service at 975-8300 to make a report. The graffiti will be photographed by an investigator, added to the graffiti data base, and investigated. Many charges result from reported graffiti and without reporting, the damage continues unanswered.

As we drive through our neighborhood, sometimes we see the eyesore created by the overnight activities of a prolific group of graffiti vandals. Do you think of your own son or daughter and wonder "Is my son or daughter involved in this type of criminal activity"? If you think that your kids could not possibly be taggers, think again. Taggers are generally members of small loosely knit groups of teens, many from middle to upper class income families, whose primary source of entertainment and excitement is the vandalism of private property with "tagger graffiti". Your child could be a member of one of these groups.

Some of the indicators are:

- Your child stays out all night or until early morning
- Your child frequently wears a large back pack or baggy pants. Packs and loose clothing can be used to hold paint cans or carry graffiti tools. Clothing or back pack may be paint stained. Hands or fingers may be paint or marker stained.
- Your child has taken up the hobby of ink making.
- Your child has large quantities of magic markers, shoe polish containers, bug spray cans, starch cans or other devices used for drawing / painting. Your child may not have the income to purchase these items.
- Your child carries tools used for etching glass, hole punches, rocks, glass cutters, screw drivers, awls, metal scribes or other sharp objects. Your child might not be able to explain exactly why s/he has the item(s) in their possession.
- Tags you see in the neighborhood are also on your child's bedroom walls, notebooks or other possessions.

Saskatoon has 5 seasons - Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter & POTHOLE SEASON!!

Frequently Asked Questions About Pothole Repairs

When does the Spring Blitz begin?

The Spring Blitz begins in April, as soon as the hot-asphalt material is available.

How can I report a pothole?

Drivers and residents can report a pothole online at saskatoon.ca (search for Report a Pothole) or call Public Works customer service at 306-975-2476. **Please call if it is an emergency and has the potential to cause damage or injury.**

How do I use the online Report a Pothole map?

From any mobile or desktop device, go to the Report a Pothole webpage. From there, you can enter an address, use the GPS locator or click on a point in the map where the pothole is located. If you need to adjust the location, click Cancel in the form box and click on a new point. Once you complete the form with details about the pothole, a red dot will appear. Once the pothole is repaired, the dot will appear green. For step by step instructions, watch the Report a Pothole demonstration video or review the Report a Pothole Help menu on the Report a Pothole webpage.

Why are some streets not on the map?

Saskatoon continues to grow and some new roads and structures may not be displayed on the map. This map will be updated periodically as new versions are available, but if you are not able to mark the exact pothole location on the map, please include location details in the comment field in your service request. The Imagery view may also help you to find the pothole location. To change the map view, select the four-square icon in the top right of the screen. You may also call Customer Service at 306-975-2476 or use the GPS locator when safe to do so.

I reported a pothole online, but it hasn't been fixed. How long will it take to repair potholes once they are reported?

Each day, an inspector will visit and rate the potholes that were reported. Until the full spring and summer pothole blitzes are underway, only potholes that cause concern in the driving lanes of priority one and two streets will be repaired with a temporary fill. Potholes with the potential for causing damage are considered an emergency and will be repaired as quickly as possible. For a pothole emergency, please call the customer service call center to report the location at 306-975-2476.

In some cases, what is reported as a pothole is actually a pavement cut/ utility cut. That is when an underground repair required crews to dig up the roadway. Once the repair is completed, the hole is backfilled with gravel until it can be paved. Crews will continue to maintain the gravel cover and blade with a grader as required. Deficiencies can be reported by calling the customer service call center at 306-975-2476. Utility cuts on priority streets are shown on the map, will be regularly monitored & will be permanently paved in summer.

Crews were repairing potholes on a priority street, but why didn't they repair all of them, including some big ones?

In order to quickly address the priority streets with immediate driving concerns, crews are repairing the potholes within the driving lanes first. Once the Spring and Summer pothole Blitzes begin, they will return to address concerns in the areas along the curb or in parking lanes.

What are considered "Priority Streets"?

Priority 1 streets include freeway; access to fire halls, hospitals and ambulance sites; and major roads such as 8th Street and 22nd Street. Priority 2 streets include rapid transit bus routes and busy roads such as Broadway Avenue, Fairlight Drive and 37th Street.

Which potholes get fixed first?

Potholes are rated on the following criteria: location (driving lane, curb lane); priority class of street; and how hazardous the pothole is for drivers. Locations are developed for each crew's area that allows them to repair the potholes in an orderly manner. Until the pothole program is in full operation, once the streets are dry and hot asphalt is available, only potholes in the driving lanes of priority streets will be addressed.

I have damage on my car from a pothole. Who do I report the damage to and how do I make a claim against the City to pay for it?

If you have damage to your vehicle, you should contact your insurance provider. For more information, visit the Report a Pothole web page and click on the link for Report a Claim for Vehicle Damage.

Why are there so many potholes and what causes them?

Potholes occur when moisture gets into the cracks in the pavement, then freezes & expands. The pressure that is created causes the asphalt to break away, resulting in a pothole. Vehicles driving over a pothole can cause the edges to crumble, which increases the size.

What are "utility cuts"?

Utility cuts occur when an underground repair requires crews to dig up the roadway. Once the repair is completed, the hole is backfilled with gravel until it can be paved. Crews will continue to maintain the driving surface as required. Deficiencies can be reported by calling the customer service call centre at 306-975-2476. Utility cuts on priority streets will be regularly monitored and will be permanently paved in the summer. The current utility cuts are shown on the map.

Why doesn't the City fix potholes & utility cuts in winter?

The City does repair potholes and utility cuts in the winter, however, during the winter, the fixes can only be temporary. This is because the best way to repair holes or utility cuts is by using a hot-mix asphalt, which can only be produced in warmer temperatures. In the winter, potholes and utility cuts are maintained with gravel and recycled asphalt. This temporary mix may shift or settle during a freeze/thaw cycle.

The utility cut cannot be properly fixed until the frost is largely out of the ground, and hot-mix asphalt can be used.

Will the fixes be permanent or will the potholes come back?

For pothole and utility cut repairs to be effective, daytime temps must be consistent at +2 degrees range or warmer. When temperatures fall at night, hot-mix asphalt can neither be produced nor placed effectively. Repairs are most effective when conducted during the warmest part of the day.

The reality is that changing temperatures and ground conditions can result in potholes forming within hours or occurring next to areas previously repaired. This is not uncommon in our climate. Crews will be re-visiting sites where potholes re-emerge.

Proposed Future School For Hampton Village



Proposed School Site

The proposed school for Hampton Village is being planned to accommodate 750 kids on the public side and 650 kids on the Catholic side. It will also have a central joint use area that could include such things as a Childcare Centre, a Family Resource Centre, Program Arts, Pre-Kindergarten & Gyms. The school is meant to open in September 2017.

Future Saskatoon Schools

It is a well-known fact that elementary schools serve as a community hub for the residents of a neighbourhood. Schools, outside the regular school day, are a central place for public meetings, a site for community associations, as well as for a variety of public, non-profit & private service providers. Accordingly, the City of Saskatoon and all of the partners, including the provincial government, Saskatoon Public School Division, & the Greater Saskatoon Catholic School Division are committed to an integrated approach.

How was input selected on the design of the schools?

The Ministry of Education invited students, teachers, parents, school division administrators, & community members to a workshop to design the new schools. The goal was to create a design that puts the student first while respecting the uniqueness of each school division & the communities where the schools will be built.

What are the next steps in the design process?

Group2, the architects that conducted the workshop, used participants' ideas & insights to create a design with comfortable & creative spaces for students to achieve success. Group2 is further refining the design in collaboration with the school divisions to meet local needs.

What are the timelines for the development of the new schools in Saskatoon?

The design and procurement process continue until construction starts. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2015. The schools are scheduled to be completed by September 2017.

What is the Community Centre Levy?

The City of Saskatoon first established a Community Centre Levy for all new neighbourhoods to ensure there would always be a facility within each neighbourhood to serve as the community hub for residents. The Community Centre Levy is held in trust by the City through a one-time charge against new land development placed on each lot sale in Evergreen, Hampton Village, Rosewood, and Stonebridge.

How does my community benefit from programming opportunities?

The new school design will allow a majority of residents, and a broad range of age groups, to access key services in recreation, sport, culture, and education as a central location. The facility will bring schools and community closer together for learning, and create value-added opportunities through shared use and interaction.

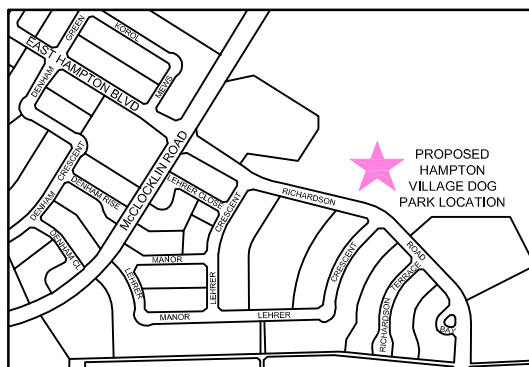

Proposed Hampton Village Off-Leash Dog Park

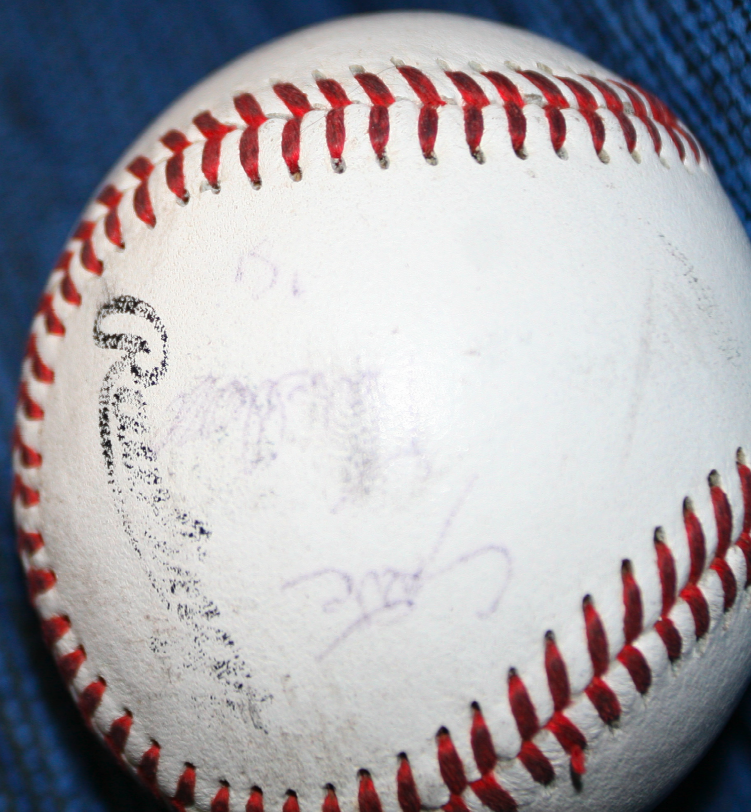

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Mass alerts when you need to know.

An emergency can happen at any time. It can be city-wide or area specific. It can be big or small. And no matter what kind of emergency it is, from a weather event to a chemical leak, Saskatoon is ready to respond appropriately.

And now, when an emergency happens, Notify *NOW* will let residents know what to do, where to go and what to expect during any potential emergency with a message sent directly to their phone, cell phone or email. With the push of just one button we can immediately send information directly to thousands of residents, helping to keep Saskatoon safe.

How does it work? When an emergency alert is issued, you will receive a voice message to your home, work or cell phone; an email; or a text message depending on your preference. To receive notifications, residents must have some form of contact information entered into our database. You can do this by signing up to Notify *NOW* through the City of Saskatoon website. If you do not sign up, you may still be contacted if your traditional phone (landline) is publically listed in the 2013/2014 SaskTel phonebook. You can customize how you would prefer to receive messages. These options include: SMS text message, Voice call to a landline or cell phone & Email. To customize your profile, or to subscribe your unlisted telephone number, please visit the City of Saskatoon website. The information you provide is kept confidential and will not be used for any purpose other than to contact you in the event of an emergency.

LONGER-LASTING ROAD MARKINGS ON ROADWAYS THIS YEAR

The City of Saskatoon is taking a new approach to line painting on major roadways & high-speed freeways this year by expanding the use of durable markings. When these types of roadways are built or rehabilitated, durable markings will be used. Durable markings are more visible & also last longer than regular road paint.

“Winter operations, including the use of gravel and snow clearing, as well as higher traffic volumes, wear off road paint faster,” says Angela Gardiner, Director of Transportation. “This is why we are expanding the use of more durable markings on higher volume roadways. While the upfront cost is higher, these markings last longer and are visible year round.”

The cost of the annual road marking program is \$800,000 per year. In 2014, an additional \$500,000 will be spent on durable markings.

Road marking begins once sweeping is underway & nighttime temperatures are consistently at 5 degrees or warmer (generally late April/early May and until late October).

There are no specific dates for painting road markings as the program is coordinated during or after other road work, and is weather dependent. High-traffic areas (such as downtown & Idylwyld Drive) are generally painted during the night to minimize disruption to traffic.

In 2014, some of the locations where durable markings will be installed include:

- Circle Drive – Circle Drive North to Attridge Drive overpass, eastbound
- Circle Drive – Warman Road to Circle Drive, eastbound
- 51st Street

City crews paint road markings two to three times per year:

- Lane lines, edge lines and centre lines are painted three times a year
- Crosswalks are painted at least twice a year
- Sharrows, chevrons and parking stall lines are painted once a year
- Road markings are re-painted if they have been removed due to paving, patching, etc.

HEARTBLEED: NO AFFECT ON CITY SERVICES

The Information Technology Division has investigated City-web based services and discovered City of Saskatoon services are not vulnerable to the computer bug known as *Heartbleed*.

“Customers should feel absolutely comfortable to access City online payment services,” says Brenda Wallace, Acting Director of Information Technology. “It’s business as usual for anyone wanting to pay a parking ticket, renew a pet licence or to subscribe to our green-bin service.”

Heartbleed allows computer hackers to access information that should be securely encrypted on a website such as usernames, passwords, credit card numbers, banking information and online shopping information.

Heartbleed has existed for a couple of years but is now receiving attention because a fix for the flaw has been publicly released and researchers have now realized how dangerous the bug was.

Current information suggests anywhere from 17 to 65 percent of websites could be affected.

REMINDER: PROPERTY OWNERS ACCESSING CIVIC PARKS REQUIRE PERMISSION

Spring is a busy time of year for projects in the yard, garden, and around the home. Saskatoon residents with a property adjacent to a civic park may wish to use it as an access point for deliveries, equipment, or vehicles related to their projects. In order to ensure that parks are safe and enjoyed by everyone, any type of work in a park that requires vehicles, equipment, or restricted access, must first have approval from the City of Saskatoon Parks Division.

Parks Division will evaluate the request, conduct a site inspection, and if reasonable, provide approval. In order to minimize any damages, vehicle access will be permitted only when turf conditions are dry and suitable for driving on. The property owner will be responsible for removing any litter or debris, repairing any damages at their own expense, and being liable for injury that may occur as a result of the work. City of Saskatoon Inspectors regularly follow-up on complaints and investigate damage to parks.

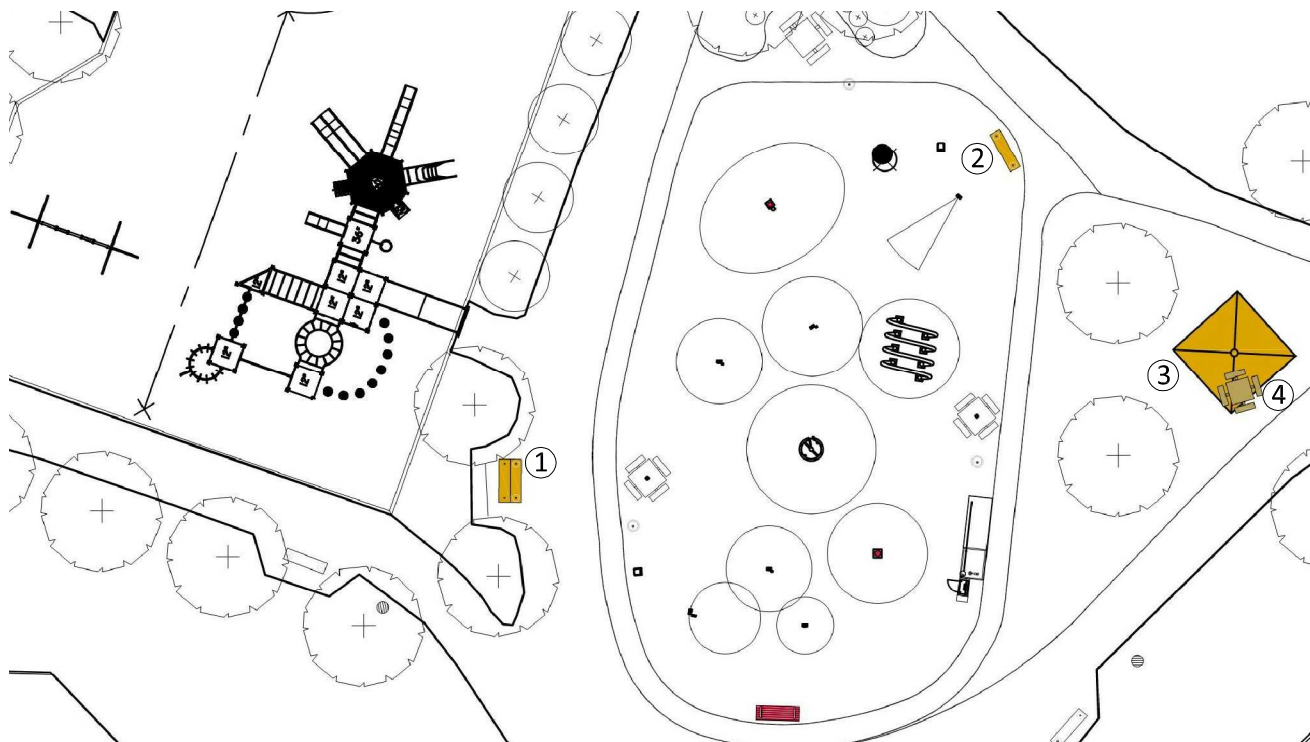

As you know, the HVCA has been fundraising over the past few years to complete our new rink. Now that it is finally done, in use (YAY!) and FABULOUS!, the HVCA has agreed to focus our fundraising efforts on improving our park!

Currently, there are 3 picnic tables and 2 benches in the immediate area of the Spray Park, and then more benches and picnic tables on the pathways around the area.

Al Anderson Park Enhancement

While the decision is far from final, the proposed new Site Furniture is as follows:

- 1) back-to-back bench between the Spray Park and Playground,
- 2) a single bench in the north-east corner of the Spray Park,
- 3) a snazzy Shade Structure east of the Spray Park (similar to picture below) (it stands alone and does not need to be mounted on play equipment or any other pre-existing structures - this could have a picnic table underneath or it could be left as straight grass underneath so that people can throw down a blanket & sit)
- 4) a possible picnic table under the Shade Structure

The total cost for these improvements would be:

- 3 benches @ \$350.00 each
- 1 Picnic Table @ \$1400.00
- 1 "Cooltoppers" Shade Structure @ \$3,700
- Installation of all pieces = \$3400
- TOTAL = \$10,000 (approximately)
