Hampton Village—A Historical Perspective

Location! Location! Location! Every realtor will tell you this is the most important feature of your home. Whether buying or selling, location determines the price and attractiveness of your home. But what is it that determines your home's location? Or, in our case, what are the origins of Hampton Village? Why is it called Hampton Village?

The answer goes back over 100 years to a city expansion plan known as the "Yorath Plan." This plan was conceived in 1913 by visionary city commissioner Christopher Yorath. His plan included all of Saskatoon which he envisioned as a beautiful flowery city. To achieve this, he thought the city must be well planned and clean with residential sections separated from industrial areas. He also believed that the natural lay of the land, its undulations and configurations, must be preserved and enhanced. As for streets, he believed it was better to have wider streets. Yorath's plan even included recommended widths for all streets. He proposed center boulevards with grass margins so that the roads could easily be widened if necessary. Open spaces, parks and recreational areas would preserve the natural beauty of the city. Yorath thought it essential that city residents have easy access to parks and green space. Yorath also proposed what he called an "encircling road" around Saskatoon.

Included in Yorath's vision for Saskatoon was an area called "New Hampton Park," located slightly north of the present Hampton Village. If envisioned 100 years ago, why did it take so long for our community to develop? It was not due to the City of Saskatoon's lack of interest in developing New Hampton Park. Some communities were developed according to Yorath's plans but, overall, it was an ambitious plan and events such as The Great War, the Depression and the Second World War prevented all aspects of its development.

But the plan was not forgotten. The city continued to plan for expansions, purchasing land as it became available. The first section of Hampton Village was annexed on July 10, 1979, the second on May 30, 2000. On August 14, 2000 our community was named. The developers proposed Hampton Village because it sat so close to the previously proposed "New Hampton Park." It is easy to see that many of Yorath's ideas were incorporated into today's Hampton Village, especially the importance of parks and recreational areas. And that encircling road? We know it as "Circle Drive" which was finally completed 100 years after Yorath proposed it with the completion of the South Circle Drive Bridge.

The street names in Hampton Village are not derived from the "Yorath Plan." They were selected to link Hampton Village to pioneer businesses from Saskatoon's early days. The street names were chosen and approved by the Naming Advisory Committee on July 19, 2004. Find out the historical significance of your street name on page two! Allwood	John Allwood operated a harness making business on Broadway Avenue.						
Coad	Percy Howard Coad is recognized by the Coad street names. Mr. Coad was a pioneer pharmacist who operated "Coad Drugs". This business opened in 1908 and was located Avenue B and 20 th Street. The pharmacy was rebuilt in 1971.Three generations of the C family have operated a pharmacy on the same location and maintain an interest in it to t day.						
Dawson	Brothers Cornelius and Albert Dawson operated "Dawson Electric" on Avenue D in the Riversdale area of Saskatoon.						
Denham	Joseph Matthew Denham founded "Denham Awning Makers" in 1938. As of 2016, this third generation family business has been in operation for 77 years!						
Geary	Michael Carver Geary was a 1906 pioneer. He was a health inspector, insurance agent and liquor business operator.						
Greenfield	John (Jack) Greenfield delivered water by the pail to Saskatoon residents.						
Hargreaves	Mr. Hargreaves owned and operated a printing and stationary shop.						
Henick	Edward Henick operated a family butcher shop called "Henick Brothers Meats".						
Klassen	This is the family name of local retailers: "Klassen Jewellers".						
Korol	The Korol streets are named for an early Saskatoon pioneer family who worked on street car track installation.						
Lehrer	Henry Lehrer was a pioneer in business and real estate development						
McCallum	Thomas Kerr McCallum was the First Royal Bank manager of the Royal Bank at Second Avenue and 21 st Street.						
McClocklin	Thomas McClocklin was the founder of the "OK Economy Stores" and "McClocklin Real Estate" in 1910.						
McKague	George Henry McKague started "McKaque Funeral Home" in 1913.						
Pulles	John Pulles operated "Brothers Bakery" and "Broadway Bakery".

Update from our City Councillor-Troy Davies

The twinning of the east bound lane of Claypool between McClocklin and Airport Drive will begin in May. During the twinning of Claypool, the city will address the drainage issues on the corner of Claypool and McClocklin by installing proper catch basins. Mr. Davies has requested the city have single lane traffic, east and westbound, on the westbound lanes while this construction takes place so Claypool Drive can remain open. The work is expected to be completed in July 2016, weather permitting.

The Off - leash Dog Park is currently being tendered with the hopes to begin construction in June.

Mr. Davies is looking forward to receiving the concept plan for the Fire Hall land that will be rezoned as well as the plan to complete the North East Commercial sector in Hampton Village. As soon as he is able, he will share this information with Hampton Villagers.





HAMPTON VILLAGE SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT

Earlier in spring as I drove west along Hampton Crescent to work in the predawn darkness each day, my headlights reflected on the school framework as I approached Hampton Circle. At first the reflection was stationary, but soon I realized it was a hive of activity as I saw reflections busily moving across the skeleton of the school. These were workers. climbing the scaffolds and beginning their work day. In late February, they were adding to the skeletal framework by inserting walls and applying an exterior 'skin' to the building. That exterior 'skin' is almost completely applied. and the ongoing transformation will not be as obvious as I drive to work each day. Still, walking around the perimeter of site is impressive. To me, the location seems right-it is at the heart of our community. A good place for a school.



The Hampton Village School is designed to have two full size gyms along with two multi-purpose activity rooms. The school is two stories with elevators located on both the public and Catholic sides of the building. The building will face southeast with the front entrances along Hampton Circle. The detailed blueprint (available at the website indicated below) shows the orientation on the lot, the plan and the elevation images. The central core area is the shared space, with two large gymnasiums bordering a physical activity space. The child care area and cafeteria are at the front of the school. The wings of the schools are clustered according to learning communities, with kindergarten and grade 1 being one cluster and grades 2 to 8 being the other. Each school division will have its own entrance.

The Catholic School is named St. Lorenzo Ruiz but the public school is not yet named. More community consultation is planned before the board decides on the names for all four of the new Saskatoon schools. Community meetings for each new school are currently being planned for some time in May. At these meetings, the Public School Board will be looking for feedback regarding the school name.

Also at the meetings in May, the Public School Board is expecting to introduce the new principal for each school and have division staff members available to answer any questions about the school's detailed design or future programming.

Once the meeting dates are confirmed, they will be shared through the neighbouring schools and in the new school communities, as well as on the division website <u>www.saskatoonpublicschools.ca</u> and social media accounts.

In the meantime, we wait and watch as this important component of our community takes shape. I welcome this addition to our neighbourhood and am excited for the benefits a school provides for our community.

Live Well with Chronic Conditions/pain self-

management workshops are free programs offered by the Saskatoon Health Region for anyone with a chronic health condition such as Diabetes, Arthritis, M.S., Heart Disease, Lung Disease, Cancer, Depression, and chronic pain etc. The programs are developed by Stanford University Patient Education Research Center. The workshop covers content that is common among people with different health challenges and is beneficial for anyone with one or more chronic conditions, as well as caregivers or support people. Participants in the workshop learn practical skills such as: getting started with lifestyle changes (exercise, healthy eating etc.), problem solving, decision making, communication, working with health care professionals, dealing with difficult emotions, dealing with fatigue, and dealing with shortness of breath. They also learn cognitive techniques such as positive self-talk and relaxation.

Two trained peer leaders meet with groups of up to 15 participants for 2 ½ hours, once a week for six consecutive weeks. Classes are fun and practical. Participants have found the workshops extremely beneficial.
