

Hampton Village School Development

Hampton Village is now ten years old but is still a relatively new community. This is an exciting time in our community, a time of growth and a time of change. A big change is the building of Hampton Village School which is to be located at the corner of Hampton Green and Hampton Circle. This has been long awaited and is much needed. Land preparation is expected to start this spring, as the Province intends to begin construction this summer.

What is involved with land preparation? The land must be graded and levelled. Also, some trees may be removed. The existing park pathway extending from Hampton Circle and moving west through Al Anderson Park may also be altered to create more green space for the school property. During the land preparation and subsequent development of the school, the part of Al Anderson Park north of the school construction site will be unavailable to community members. The



Proposed School Site - The proposed school for Hampton Village is being planned to acomodate 750 kids on the public side and 650 kids on the Catholic side. It will also have a central join use area that could include such things as a Childcare Centre, a Family Resource Centre, Program Arts, Pre-Kindergarten & Gyms. The school is meant to open in September 2017.

temporary closure of this part of Al Anderson Park helps provide some flexibility in the land preparation and school construction schedule and ensures safety on the job site and in our community. Currently, our ice rink is also positioned on land set aside for the school. Because of the requirements involved with land preparation our rink will be taken down and relocated at a date and location yet to be determined. This is a perfect opportunity to upgrade our rink! Please contact Ron at rink@saskhvca.com if you will be able to help with the rink upgrade.

The conceptual drawing shown above may not reflect the final design of the school or property as the final drawing is yet to be chosen. All of us, as residents of Hampton Village, will watch with interest as the school is developed. It will be amazing to see our new school, the modifications to Al Anderson Park, and the new location for our rink. Keep your eyes on the changes coming for the land at Hampton Green and Hampton Circle!

Garage Sale Tips

Before Sale Day & Set Up Sale Day & Set Up

-Be prepared for the garage sale BEFORE 8:00am as shoppers tend to show up early

- -Have plenty of change on hand (coin & paper)
- -Have enough tables to display your items
- -Large colorful items should be placed at the front of your property to draw in customers
- -Have an outlet available if

customers want to try an appliance
-Clothing is best sold if hung neatly on a rack (a broom stick between two ladders works) and clearly priced



-Use balloons at the front of your lot

to draw customers
-Park your vehicles
off street if possible
for visibility and
parking & add
some fun signs
-Count your float
prior to the sale so
you can keep track
of your earnings

-Have Help! - at least two people available to run you sale allows you to have bathroom breaks and better customer service!



Pricing

-Have all pricing completed a week in advance, and set up tables the day before, ready to move them out to their visible locations.

-If you have odds-and-ends items, such as mismatched glasses, price them at 6 for \$1.00 instead of \$0.15 -Be prepared to barter with your customers, and as the day goes on you may want to reduce prices on some items to clear them out -If doing a multi-group sale, put a last or first name initial on the tags, remove tags as you sell the items and then go through all tags at the end of the day to determine who gets what profit

Clear Clutter with a Yard Sale!

Your yard sale inventory is living right under your nose! The first step is to find it. In the weeks before your sale, scour closets and cupboards, bookcases and basement for yard sale finds. How to decide? Some yard-salers ask these questions: "Have I cooked with it, worn it, displayed it, used it or read it within the last year?" Others apply a percentage rule: a firm 10 to 20 percent of all books, videos, clothing, or bric-a-brac must go. Either way, remind yourself that the goal is to clear clutter and make room in your organized home by finding new homes for items you don't use, need or love. Challenge family members to contribute, and sweeten the deal by offering a cut of the profits. Children will be much more amenable to parting with outgrown toys if they see that there's something in it for them, in the form of cold, hard cash.

To get the most out of your yard sale, consider finding a clutter buddy. When it comes to culling clutter, two heads are better than one--and a two-family yard sale will get twice the traffic for half the trouble. Back one another up, and dare each other to clear clutter to the bone to stock the sale. Once an item's selected for sale, be stern! Store yard sale inventory in black plastic garbage bags or records boxes with lids to deter seller's remorse. No fair reading, looking or cooking; once an item is in the yard sale staging area, there is no appeal, no mercy and no second chance. Give that wedding-gift s'mores maker an emotional divorce. It's no longer junk or stuff, it's inventory!

Estimated Project Timeline & Details

May 3 - August 30, 2015 Deck repairs which will impact traffic is expected to occur August 31 - Sept 15, 2015 Demobilization from site - not expected to impact traffic

-A single lane of traffic will remain open for emergency vehicles, Saskatoon Transit buses, Saskatoon Health Region authorized vehicles and school buses contracted by the Saskatoon School Boards only. (Will accommodate travel in both directions.)
-A single walkway will also remain open at all times during construction.


The following are the most efficient routes from each quadrant of the City to cross the river during construction:

Southeast to Downtown – Use 8th Street or Circle Dr > Sid Buckwold Bridge

The Florida Girl

I met the "Florida girl" at her place of employment in Hampton Village. Her distinctive accent caught my attention, and I asked her where she was from originally. "Florida," she answered. After she tells people where she is from, the next question she is asked is almost inevitable: "Why would anyone move from Florida to Saskatchewan?"

So why did the "Florida Girl," who works at Affinity Insurance in Hampton Village, move to Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada? Like so many people who have moved to Saskatoon in the last decade, it is all about employment. Her husband is a respiratory technologist, and, as such, is in big demand in health regions in Saskatchewan.

What is it like to move almost 4000 kms away from the sun and beaches of Florida? What does Saskatchewan look like through the eyes of a southerner? "Florida girl" said she was a kid in a candy store when they arrived here: everything was new, different, and beautiful. She left the extreme heat and humidity of Florida for the opportunity to play in Saskatchewan snow! But she has also learned that it is not like the movies. Her 21 month old son did not like the snow at all! He would not even touch it. She also had a bad fall this past winter due to snow and ice that had not been cleared from the road. That was painful and no fun at all! It left her hobbling around a bit. In spite her injury this winter and the extreme cold, she enjoys the scenery and has taken many beautiful photographs. She loves seeing the frozen water and the snow on the trees. Like many of us, she does not like driving in the snow, especially before the roads are plowed. But the one bright point is that she has found the people of Saskatchewan to be very friendly!

There are many more differences, notably health care. Another big difference is the distances people travel for entertainment and shopping. The flip side, of course, is less traffic and the possibility of new and interesting things to do in a growing city.

Like the rest of us, "Florida girl" is glad that spring has arrived and the temperatures are more pleasant. Her entire family is much happier with the onset of warmer temperatures. Slowly, they are becoming acclimatized to the changing seasons of the prairies but they are not sure about swimming in one of Saskatchewan's many lakes as it still seems pretty cold to them. They are, however, looking forward to fishing this summer. Suggestions for fishing adventures are welcome!

Maybe you will meet "Florida girl" at Affinity Insurance, at the community barbeque on May 9, or at Family Fest on June 25. These are all places and occasions to meet our neighbours, make new friends, and learn about other places.

Bike Safety!

With the warm weather finally here what better time for a quick refresher on bike safety!

- 1. Obey traffic signs and signals Bicycles must follow the rules of the road like other vehicles.
- 2. Never ride against traffic Motorists aren't looking for bicyclists riding on the wrong side of the road. Provincial law and common sense require that bicyclists drive like other vehicles.
- 3. Follow lane markings Don't turn left from the right lane. Don't go straight in a lane marked "right-turn only."
- 4. Don't pass on the right Motorists may not look for or see a bicycle passing on the right.
- 5. Scan the road behind you Learn to look back over your shoulder without losing your balance or swerving. Some riders use rear-view mirrors.
- 6. Keep both hands ready to brake You may not stop in time if you brake one-handed. Allow extra distance for stopping in the rain, since brakes are less efficient when wet.
- 7. Always wear a helmet. Never wear headphones while riding.
- 8. Dress for the weather In rain wear a poncho or waterproof suit. Dress in layers so you can adjust to temperature changes. Wear bright colored clothing.
- 9. Use hand signals Hand signals tell motorists and pedestrians what you intend to do. Signal as a matter of law, of courtesy, and of self-protection.
- 10. Ride in the middle of the lane in slower traffic Get in the middle of the lane at busy intersections and whenever you are moving at the same speed as traffic.
- 11. Use lights at night!

- 12. Choose the best way to turn left There are two choices: (1) Like an auto: signal to move into the left turn lane and then turn left. (2) Like a pedestrian: ride straight to the far side crosswalk. Walk your bike across.
- 13. Make eye contact with drivers Assume that other drivers don't see you until you are sure that they do. Eye contact is important with any driver which might pose a threat to your safety.
- 14. Look out for road hazards Watch out for parallel-slat sewer grates, gravel, ice, sand or debris. Cross railroad tracks at right angles.
- 15. Keep your bike in good repair Adjust your bike to fit you and keep it working properly. Check brakes and tires regularly. Routine maintenance is simple and you can learn to do it yourself.



Off-Leash Dog Park for Hampton Village

A new Off-Leash Dog Park within Hampton Village was approved by City Council on February 23, 2015. The location is along Richardson Road and East of McClocklin Road. The plan is very pleasing to the eye and proposes maximum use of the available space with three access points. The trail will be covered in crusher dust which should make it less muddy in spring. The addition of a wide buffer zone of green space with trees and benches on the street side of the park will increase "curb appeal" and invite all residents to enjoy the space. To alleviate the parking concerns raised by Hampton Villagers, ten parking spaces were added to the front entrance way of the park.



Next steps include tendering this project for construction this spring and construction completion in the fall of 2015.

Spring Street Sweeping Blitz and Pothole Blitz programs

The Spring Street Sweeping Blitz programs and the Pothole Blitz program have begun! Priority 1 streets will be swept at night to enhance public and crew safety and reduce the impact for drivers. Priority 2 streets will be swept during the daytime hours.

"With warmer weather finally here, we want to get out there and clean things up as quickly as possible," says Pat Hyde, Director of Public Works. "Less sand and debris on the priority streets as a result of the improved winter de-icing and snow removal programs will contribute to the success of the spring clean-up programs."

The Spring Sweeping Blitz is designed to collect the bulk of the debris left behind over winter and benefits the Accelerated City Wide Neighbourhood Sweeping program by making it more efficient and cost effective. The Blitz will also remove sand and debris from medians where snow was stored. There will be no parking enforcement applied during the Blitz programs. Sweepers will go around parked vehicles.

2015 Improvements:

- When weather permitted, crews were out as early as March 30, pre-sweeping many high-traffic streets in advance of the Blitz.
- · A new coordinated approach to first sweeping medians and boulevards on high-priority streets will be more efficient and reduce traffic impact.

Once the Blitz sweep programs are complete, the Accelerated City-Wide Neighbourhood Sweeping begins and will continue for approximately six weeks, weather dependant. Should the Blitz sweep programs progress as scheduled the City Wide program is expected to start on May 4. During the City-Wide program parking enforcement will be applied in order to allow for a full curb-to-curb sweep. Further information will be provided closer to the program start date.

The Spring Pothole Blitz will be focused along many of the same high-traffic streets as the Spring Street Sweeping Blitz programs. Pothole repairs for all remaining streets will also continue throughout the Accelerated City Wide Neighbourhood Sweeping program. Hot-mix asphalt is now available and is being used to repair potholes. Residents are encouraged to report locations with the online Report-a-Pothole map or call Public Works Customer Service at 306-975-2476.

The Spring Sweeping Blitz Schedule is available at saskatoon.ca/betterroads. Stay tuned for the Accelerated City-Wide Neighbourhood Sweeping Schedules to be posted soon.

Go Green!

Green Carts - register by June 1st

Keep yard waste out of your garbage cart - register for a green cart today!

The City of Saskatoon Green Cart program has expanded so more residents can conveniently dispose of yard waste without putting it in their black garbage cart. (Food waste is not accepted in the 2015 Green Cart program.) For \$55 the City will collect your un-bagged leaves, grass clippings and non-elm tree trimmings every two weeks from May to November. Register online at Saskatoon.ca/greencart. New registrations and renewals accepted until June 1. For more information call 306-975-2486.

Compost Depots - open April 13th

The City's compost depots open in mid-April through Nov 6, 2015 (weather permitting) for residents to drop off their leaves, grass and non-elm branches and tree trimmings free of charge. If you have any questions about the Compost Depots, please contact the Customer Service Line at 306-975-2486 or visit www.saskatoon.ca/services-residents/waste-recycling/composting.

Where are they?

West - Highway 7 Compost Depot

- Located at the junction of Highway 7 and 11th Street
- Open every day of the week, including Stats, 9-6 pm

East - Highway 5 Compost Depot

 Located off Highway 5 by junction of Highway 41 & Zimmerman Road. Follow signs

Open Thursday to Monday, including Stats, 11-5 pm

Materials accepted free of charge:

- leaves
- sod
- grass
- topsoil
- non-elm branches, stumps and tree trimmings

Materials NOT accepted at the compost depots:

- elm wood
- wood chips
- sawdust
- mulch
- any lumber
- building materials
- stone, brick
 clay, sand, gravel
- any other waste product



The compost from our Compost Depots is used to improve our parks, community gardens and other public green spaces. The City will not be selling compost or mulch from the Depots in 2015.

Yard waste makes up over 1/3 of the garbage from an average household, taking up valuable landfill space and contributing to greenhouse gas emissions. When yard waste is buried in the landfill, it doesn't turn into soil or compost because of the airless environment. Instead, it creates nasty stuff like methane gas and liquid leachate, which has to be managed under strict environmental regulations. The City of Saskatoon demonstrates environmental leadership through outreach, partnerships, and community programs that help Saskatoon thrive in harmony with its natural environment & conserve resources.

Hampton Village Spray Park Enhancement!!

Are you are ever too old to run through a sprinkler?!



How about hosting a water party when it's sooo hot!? But inviting the whole neighborhood over to your backyard to play is probably not an option! Meeting your friends at the spray park in Hampton Village is!

And it's about to get better!!!

This past winter, the HVCA applied for a Park Enhancement Grant and we were lucky enough to get one!! This grant provides opportunities to add components to our existing park amenities! Eligible projects usually cost under \$25,000, and the HVCA is planning to add a sun shade, benches and picnic table to our spray park area. The work to complete HVCA's Park Enhancement project is scheduled to be started this summer!



Upgrades to McClocklin Road and Claypool Drive

Does your morning commute take you east along McClocklin Road or through the intersection of Claypool and McClocklin? If so, you are aware of the problems and challenges at this intersection. If it is not traffic congestion, it is water pooling from either the spring melt or a heavy rainstorm. At least several residents of Hampton Village have contacted the city to make them aware of the problems and to inquire as to their plans to address these problems.

According to the city, significant improvements and upgrades are coming to these roads this year. During this summer's construction season, the intersection will be upgraded significantly. The section of Claypool east of the intersection of Claypool and McClocklin Road will become a double lane roadway in both directions and catch basins will be installed at the intersection to drain away the water. The twinning of this roadway will help handle the increased traffic volume as the city continues to grow westward.

You will also see changes to the west of the intersection of Claypool and McClocklin. For several years the double lane west bound section of Claypool has been ready but it has not been used. According to the city, the reason this portion of the road was unused was because it cannot be opened until the intersection of Claypool and McClocklin is upgraded. Once the intersection is upgraded, traffic will move in two lanes in each direction.

The upgrades to the intersection and Claypool in particular will be significant. This work is scheduled for completion sometime in late August or early September of 2015.
